Audience member Umm... How we bully our children, to make (female 1):them perform for people.....err.. how we nag

> our husbands..how our husbands are disappointed in us as mothers.. umm

Charlie:-They are quite dark - the things you're

saying!

Audience member (female 1):-

(Laughs) Yeah... yeah (generalized laughter) .. yeah, um, there's lots of different messages going on in there. And I hope that they are wise enough for their age, if they have a small son, ... to, umm -Us who have come through it and who have got older children can't give our knowledge to him... and they seem like they are really tapping into it already - But

that's talking about when you only have one child... But when you add in the sibling

dynamics...

Charlie:-It sounds to me as if you're talking from experience. Did you recognize things in

the show?

Audience member (female 1) and her friends who

(amid laughter) Oh...Yes, yes. ..yeah really! (generalized laughter)

are listening:-

Audience member I think it would be interesting for you to (female 1):gather the thoughts of people who were at that stage with just one child - or indeed, with three small children, say,

who have got sibling bonds.... as opposed to (she gestures to herself and friends) ... actually, we're all "maturer ladies", just

starting into the grandparent phase ...

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Charlie:-	First of all what did you think?
Audience member (female 2):-	I thought it was really good! I thought it was hilarious actually It really made me laugh! (she laughs - a lot) So, so funny - and so, so true! (more laughter)
Charlie :-	So it made you laugh - but we were just hearing a minute ago that it was kind of dark!? (laughter)
Audience member (female 2):-	(laughter) But it's always like that isn't it? I mean when you get the darker moments - That's what makes it so much fun as well isn't it?, yeah
Charlie:-	What about if it was well there's a word, and I'll chuck it out there, - "political" - is it a political piece, do you think?
Audience member (female 2):-	I wouldn't say immensely so no. No. I mean when you say "political" - do you mean against the royal family?
Charlie:-	Well, yeah - because it had those themes in it, didn't it?
Audience member (female 2):-	That they are just the everyday life themes aren't they? I mean every parent has those themes - I mean, well I'm saying that, maybe not me personally, but most parents kind of think - "oh I want my daughter to marry a prince" - it was more that kind of political but no more than just ordinary everyday life is political so
Charlie:-	Yeah, yeah, um we heard a minute ago that it was thought-provoking err what sorts of thoughts?
Audience member (female 2):-	(laughs) Reminiscing thoughts!! As well as I think yeah it is that - you know, You've got so much hope in your children and each other and (emotional) really and truly, it is a (pause and then brightening up) And I thought about the mess as well, actually!! (laughs (we are still sitting next to the performance space and she gestures at the white carpet covered with toys, clothes and peas) - it brings it all back!! (laughs) But it was really, really good and there's also the bit that I thought was reallyerr, you know when he's saying "My son's not

	going to be this and my son's not going to be that"And it's, you know, like you say, no-one knows how anyone's going to you know, everyone is someone's son
Charlie:-	That was moving that, wasn't it?
Audience member (female 2):-	It was <u>very</u> moving.
Charlie:-	Yeah I must admit that what it made me think of was - Fred West he was someone's son.
Audience member (female 2):-	Yeah! That's exactly what we were saying! everyone is someone's son.
Charlie:-	Yeah and there's not going to be anyone thinking "Oh I hope he grows up and murders people and buries them under the patio" well presumably there's no-one saying that
Audience member (female 2):-	No no It's a gamble, isn't it? I think they were just showing that the whole thing, it's all a big gamble, the relationship bringing up children, it's all a big I mean you never know what's gonna happen in the end. But I'm glad that we all still think that and we all still have babies and go "they're gonna be this and they're gonna be that" (laughter) or else you'd never - would you? (laughter)
Charlie:-	You've got to stay eternally optimistic!
Audience member (female 2):-	(laughter) yeah you wouldn't have them would you? If you had those thoughts.
Charlie:-	The only bit that I thought was when the political message became a "capital P", was at that very end address - because she says "We can't leave you anything" And she was kind of going through a list of things that the royal family might get left, like a title or land - And then she says but we can't leave you anything.
Audience member (female 2):-	Yeah, but then she says what they could leave him. Which is all the other things maybe. Which is maybe the royal family can't have. You know - the being silly, the running around, the freedom. So it wasn't really, you know, that's the better way and this isn't - It's like we've all got our better things, of each. The royal family have got their plusses, and so have we!

First impressions - What did you think?... it finished about ten minutes ago....

Audience member (male 1):-

yeah - it was very very... sure... I feel it encapsulated, like, a lot of themes - a lot of struggles, like, in modern family society - it was really very... it encapsulated so much .. so many issues that, like, everybody can understand. Even us (he gestures to him and his friend - who is male 2 below) as, err.. young adults who.. that's all in our future, like having children, raising families - those fears were in the play..

Audience member (male 2):-

It was like a ... of so many, like, expectations that we might have. And the way they. - God.. there's so many, so many things. The fact that everything was pink but everything was about a boy, I don't know, it just kind of, like, throws you off a bit. And the pointedness with which they say each others names - and stare at each other. And the delivery of their words. And how at the start it's like really lighthearted - it's hilarious, like really, really funny! And then suddenly it, like, turns. And you can see us all sitting around. And then they're both talking about how he might turn out as different kinds of people and character types. And everyone might wince kind of, at every sort of like fifth character description, because, they are talking about THEM! Talking about people! Um, and

you think "oh god - it's a bit too real!!" Oh man - yeah!

(male 2)

Don't actually remember. But remember seeing it plenty of times being done on younger family members (laughter)

Charlie:

Someone down there said "thoughtprovoking". And I immediately said "what thoughts?" So - off the top of your head, just immediately, what thoughts was it for you if it was thought-provoking?

Audience member

(male 2)

The thing for me.... The most crystallized thing that I will be taking away. Is like it felt like an indictment of like modern

masculinity and what it might mean. How it's sort of becoming redundant — and thinking about it a bit more. Thinking about what it means — like what its value is? 'Cos as a man growing up, and you're seeing all these different things.. And you're thinking kind of "what is it that I'm doing?"

Charlie

On the masculinity front - that was a hell of a cocktail... that he was doing, wasn't it? I mean, we heard about all the stuff like how he is a sensitive lover and all the masculine, macho ... and then he's got the pink bunny ears and the dress and... the hoover....

Audience member (male 1)

yeah! definitely! I mean, visually - the visual metaphors ramming everything home. I mean the light changing, and the absurdity! And then you've got like Peppa Pig!! (laughter) It was great!

Audience member (male 2)
