Charlie

But what about if they said "What was it? Like.. What was it? Was it a play? Or was it a, was it err, a comedian? Or whatever" - err, I mean, what are you going to tell them?

Umm - It was a torrent of spoken words... that, err, means to be listened to - cos it's a story, it's storytelling and umm, err - yeah, you'll never be bored! (laughs)

Charlie

We've just come out... err, I was in there as well...

Audience Member Female 2.

Never seen anything like it in my life - that was (pause) phenomenal (laughter)

Audience Member Male 1.

It was certainly an assault on the senses! (laughter) Hmm - and it took you to a sort of place that, err, well, I've, umm, never been before, yeah! (laughter)

Audience Member Female 2.

That was fantastic! I mean, how, how does he keep talking like that?.

Charlie

Let's say when you get in tonight and a friend of yours says '- how did you enjoy the show?'

Audience Member Female 2.

Oh... I would have to explain it .. but....

Audience Member Male 1.

I, umm, wouldn't know the first thing as to how to describe it, really. But, you know, you have just got to experience it to err, so it's not the sort of thing that you can really... err..convey to anybody else.

Audience Member Female 2.

It was genius quite honestly - because I mean how that man kept talking and talking... You know, I don't know if they've got it written down - he must be exhausted! I mean - how do they do that?

Charlie

I've no idea! ...

Audience Member Female 2.

Did he write that?

Charlie

Likewise.. I don't know... I'm in the same position as you...

Oh are you not connected with them then?

Charlie

No - not at all! If it was you asking me... I think I'd say: "I'm reeling, slightly!"

Audience Member Female 2.

Audience Member Yeah! Exhausted! Yeah!

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Audience Member Male 1.

I can't imagine... how ...he must be doing this quite frequently - probably every few nights he's probably doing the same thing. And I mean it must be physically totally draining.

Charlie

Do you think it was about anything? Do you think it had meaning? I mean.. were we meant to take a message from it?

Audience Member Female 2.

I think so, yeah. I think so. I think there was .. that he's obviously a thinker, isn't he. The thought processes...

Audience Member Male 1.

Well yes - there's so many visual err, stories that he was telling right the way through. I suppose, you know, that people visualise what he was talking about. And you... yeah...

Audience Member Female 2.

Yeah - and it's just that... you know.. he's obviously a very intelligent person - that's all I can say about it..

Charlie

Yeah... There was quite a lot of laughter in there.. I think. There was quite a bit of laughter going on about the place.

Audience Member Male 1.

(laughs)

Audience Member Female 2.

(laughs) Well, I've got a bit of a black sense of humour, so I kind of did laugh a little bit... yeah

Audience Member Male 1.

I think you laughed when other people didn't! (laughs)

Audience Member Female 2.

I know.. I'm a bit naughty like that!... but yeah... but no....

Charlie

One last question.. what was it that brought you here tonight? Had you heard about the show or....

Audience Member Male 1.

No - not particularly. We have in the past been to the Arts Centre quite a lot. And we've had a bit of a break... but we've started coming again and we really like this kind of format in these evenings - it's nice to see different things. We have been to Edinburgh once...

Audience Member Female 2.

Last night we was at Swan Lake - at the Royal Opera House! (laughs) So that's a bit of a contrast!

Audience Member Male 1.

Yeah - quite a contrast!

Charlie

From one end of the Arts spectrum to the other!

Charlie

We've just come out - literally a couple of minutes ago. So first off... what's your instant reaction?

Audience Member Female 3.

I thought it was really cool, yeah... I don't know... I've just come straight from work... so it's always good to see something interesting in Colchester! (then to friend) You looked at the stuff and I just came to see it... so... (laughter) Good!

Charlie

When you get in tonight and someone says: "Did you enjoy the show?" What's your immediate answer gonna be?

Yes! (laughs) - pause - Yes - definitely! And, umm, I think that sort of, the scheme what you're doing, of sort of, "pay what you can"... I mean I've never been here before... Charlie

So if someone asks you "what was the show about?" - what are you going to tell 'em?

Audience Member Female 3

(both laugh loudly) I have ummm - to sum up... I think in just a couple of words... I think that for me it was probably more about the experience than the content, perhaps? Umm - so it was sort of the spoken word and the rhythms of the stuff he was saying that sort of hit me and then obviously the ending with the music and the level of that - and how it gets inside of you..

Charlie

It was almost physical wasn't it?

Audience Member Female 3

Yeah - the chairs almost seemed to be shaking and everything was so frantic and just sort of four musicians making that noise. So that's probably what I'd take away from it.

Charlie

Yeah, yeah, yeah... There was little bit of laughter in there, going on... I mean there wasn't people rolling about laughing I don't think. But what did you think about the humour in it?

Audience Member Female 3

Umm I though it was interesting.. I thought it was good humour. I found it funny - I was laughing! (laughs) And I don't know. I suppose with those kind of things - 'cos it's a small space and it's intimate and it's just one quy talking to you I think that p'raps it took people a little bit to warm into it and to realise that laughing was OK.
